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Toes Taper, Are Slender In Fall Shoes

Fall shoes were never prettier. They're feminine in line and character, colorful, and very flattering to the foot. They are in such a wide variety that it is hard to generalize, but certain types and treatments look very new, and some trends stand out clearly even as early as this.

The tapered toe is probably the most obvious trend. Slender and pointed, it appears on soft shoes, dressmaker in feeling, to be worn with the soft costumes of the season. The sloping shoulders, rounded curves and the silhouette that is either super-slim or full with a circular, flared look calls for shoes that are mere points of flattery on the foot.

All types—pumps, sandals, slings—are good. While we still demand open toes, closed toes, open backs, closed backs according to our tastes and needs, there seem to be more closed shoes than we have had for several seasons.

The plain closed pump is everywhere, but the shell pump, often modified and disguised by stripings or ties that hold it securely on the foot and give it a high-rise appearance, is still a favorite.

New spectators look wonderful with suits and street clothes. Cutouts trim many shoes and give them a bare look, an effect that women love. Sandals look smartest in new versions, usually rather dressy and made of narrow straps that hold the foot in a mesh.

Combinations of colors and leathers look newest, though of course the great majority of shoes will be of suede, kid, calf, reptiles and a few of patent leather (especially smart in metallic finishes).
