

# CHAMBER TO HELP IN CENSUS TAKING

## Importance of Securing Full Enumeration Is Stressed at Meet

The importance of an accurate compilation of the census of Riverside was discussed by the Riverside Chamber of Commerce last night, and the conclusion reached was that the chamber should give assistance in bringing this about.

Gardiner Draper, chairman of the census committee, reported that an effort is being made to have stickers placed on homes as the enumeration is made, and where the enumerators are unable to complete their work it is proposed that a committee of 25, appointed by the chamber, follow up the count to be certain that not a person is missed in making the enumeration.

For those who will not be at home during the census-taking period, blanks are in the hands of Mrs. H. E. DeNyse which may be filled out by the absentees.

The report of Tom Gore, chairman of the citrus committee, which shows that the Riverside citrus groves are practically free from the deadly bug pest, was received with a great deal of satisfaction. This report was published in the Press following the meeting of the citrus committee. A report on the proposed war on the thrip was made, state and county officials are studying the manner of attack.

The citrus committee, with the county horticultural commissioner, A. E. Bittel, and inspectors, will continue the drive to stop the bringing in of foreign field boxes in which to truck out fruit. The use of trucks only will be insisted upon.

J. R. Gabbert of the advertising committee reported that the matter of a trophy for the annual inter-scholastic track and field meet was in the hands of the Kiwanis club. The committee reported the publishing of a full-page advertisement in the Western Woman in which Riverside county came in for some very valuable publicity. Southern California deserts were featured. Governor C. C. Young, E. C. Merrill, former dean of the College of Agriculture of the University of California, Gifford Pinchot, former governor of Pennsylvania, Dr. Geo. Clements of the Los Angeles Chamber of Commerce, and Francis Cut-

tle, president of the Riverside Water company, are contributors to the current number of the publication.

The advertising committee also reported on the move of the State Chamber of Commerce to gather and present in a publication data on the historical points of the Southern California counties, including Riverside county. The state secretaries will meet at the county chamber meeting at San Jacinto Monday, at which gathering the Riverside chamber will be largely represented. On May 17 the committee in charge of gathering historical data, will meet in Riverside.

Mrs. Frank Lord and Mrs. E. B. Parker asked the chamber for additional financial aid for the P.-T.A. convention which meets here May 5-9.

J. E. McGregor, chairman of the chamber highway committee, was reported with the highway committee of the Southern California State Chamber of Commerce, which comes to Riverside tomorrow at noon for luncheon. The Riverside chamber will assist in entertaining this important committee. This tour is an inspection of the secondary highway systems of the Southland which the state highway commission may take over, rebuild and maintain.

James Jordan, bonds; C. C. Brinkman, photographer; Zoology Coffey Shop and C. F. Rayburn were announced as new members of the chamber.

### In Memoriam

**Margaret E. Van Petten**  
Margaret E. (Buchanan) Van Petten, daughter of Alexander and Martha Irwin Buchanan, passed away March 16 at her late home at Grand Terrace. She was born at Old Congruity, Westmoreland county, Pennsylvania, February 4, 1858.

She moved with her parents to Peoria county, Ill., in 1867, and lived the life of a farmer's daughter, attending country school until the age of 21, on August 20, 1879, she married W. J. Van Petten of the same county. They lived on a farm near her old home for ten years and there their three sons were born. They were Albert A., who died in Cuba two years ago, and whose widow and four children now live in Ashland, Ky.; Robert M., who with his wife and two children has a home at Mott, N. D.; and Oliver W., who with his wife and three children lives in Ashland, Ky. She is also survived by a brother, J. I. Buchanan of Pomona.

From their Illinois farm they removed to Elmwood, Peoria county, living there for another ten years. Their sons now being ready for advanced education, the family again moved to Champaign, Ill., so that the boys might attend the University of Illinois and still have the influence of home training. In Champaign, Mrs. Van Petten took an active interest in the Presbyterian church, and also joined the Daughters of the American Revolution, an organization of which she was very fond.

In 1912 she came to California to join her husband, who had come here for his health. Since then they have lived on a ranch at Grand Terrace, San Bernardino county. They have been keenly interested in community enterprises and Mrs. Van Petten will be sadly missed by a host of friends. She was active in the Grand Terrace Woman's club, and also worked for the farm center there.

Mr. and Mrs. Van Petten joined Calvary Presbyterian church, which she attended while able. She also joined Rubidoux chapter, D. A. R., in which she had many friends.

On August 20, 1929, Mr. and Mrs. Van Petten were privileged to celebrate their 50th wedding anniversary, which they did at Fairmount park with a large company of friends present.

For the past decade Mrs. Van Petten had been collecting data and records of her mother's family, the Irwin Clan. This work was finally completed and published in pamphlet form, just before she passed away.

The bereaved husband and two sons were with her during her last illness.

Funeral services were conducted today at the M. H. Simons & Co. chapel, and interment was made in Evergreen cemetery. Dr. James Reid, retired Presbyterian minister, spoke of the events in the life of Mrs. Van Petten, and solos were sung by Mrs. E. J. Burr. Many lovely floral offerings attested to the love and respect in which Mrs. Van Petten was held.

**Elsinore Storm Total Exceeded Four Inches**

### No Frost Damage Following Clearing Weather in Valley

HEMET, March 20.—Clearing weather brought lower temperatures to the valley yesterday morning, but no frost damage occurred and it did not prove necessary to light smudge pots in the apricot orchards. The growers were on the alert and watched their thermometers closely, but in no portion of the valley did the mercury go below 31 and in most places the minimum was 33.

With the apricot buds in their tenderest stage, this is the most uneasy period in the life of an apricot grower, and it is likely that for several mornings the ranchers will be in readiness to light smudge pots should the mercury drop to the danger mark.

BEAUMONT, March 20.—Today at his home at Beaumont avenue and Seventh street Robert Theodore Jenkins is celebrating his 92nd birthday. Mr. Jenkins was born March 20, 1838, at Canaan, New York, and in early life removed to Sterling, Ill., and later to Rock Falls, in the same state. He enlisted for the Civil war in the 39th Illinois infantry on August 14, 1861, and was honorably discharged from the service June 28, 1862.

October 30, 1862, he was married to Frances E. Barber, who has preceded him in death. They came to California in 1882, living at Los Angeles about one and one-half years, then came to Beaumont in 1884, and here Mr. Jenkins has resided continuously for more than 46 years.

Living with him is his daughter, Miss Ruth Jenkins, and directly across the street another daughter, Mrs. W. W. Watson, lives with her family. An only son, Sidney Arthur Jenkins, is a contractor and builder at Palm Springs.

Mr. Jenkins is in fairly good health for one of his age and is able to get about the home with occasional attendance at church or going for a drive.
