### Compulsory ROTC Program At Eastern Approved By Regents

RICHMOND, Ky., March 4 (Special) — The Eastern Kentucky State College Board of Regents today approved a compulsory ROTC program.

All men enrolling as freshmen next September will be required to take two years of ROTC. The last two years of the program will remain voluntary.

All of Eastern's ROTC program now is voluntary. Eastern President Robert R. Martin said the college had been in danger of losing its ROTC program because it failed to produce the 25 commissioned officers required by the Army in two of the last five years.

The Army notified the school its ROTC program could be discontinued unless improvements were made.

Personal Plan Okayed  
The regents also approved a personnel plan affecting salaries, leaves of absence, sick leave, layoffs and dismissals.

The plan includes a policy not to employ relatives closer than first cousins of members of the board or the faculty or administrative staff.

Exceptions will be made if positions can't otherwise be filled adequately.

Four Groups  
Under the new personnel system, all employees of Eastern will be divided into four groups: 1. Faculty and administrative staff; 2. Clerical and specialist group; 3. Buildings and grounds service group; and 4. Food service group.

All the personnel policies brought before the board, except a compensation plan, will become effective immediately, according to the president. These plans will be implemented after July 1, and will become the basis for salary requests in future biennial budgets.

Salary adjustments during the current budget period will be

determined by the president on the basis of funds available.

Martin also submitted a compensation table that was approved by the board. When fully implemented, the schedule will be the basis for determining all salaries.

The board was given a report on projects at the college presently under construction as well as the status of projects to begin in the near future.

Projects Listed  
These projects include Martin Hall, addition to Case Hall, and additional units in Brockton for married students; an underground steam distribution system; air-conditioning of the Music Building; renovation of Cammack and the University Buildings; construction of a parking lot in the rear of the Music Building; landscaping of the campus; construction of additional water lines, and a \$1.8 million physical education plant.

Final plans will be submitted March 31 for the plant, which will include a 7,000-seat auditorium-gymnasium. Bids will be advertised April 15 and opened on May 15.

Martin also announced plans for a permanent trailer park; renovation of Miller, Beckham, and McCreary halls; renovation and remodeling of Johnson Student Union Building, and new classroom building and library additions.

Martin said the training school would participate in the free textbook program and his recommendation that the textbooks which have been listed by the faculties of the two schools for use in the training school program was approved.

Range Named  
On the recommendation of Lt. Col. Sanders and Martin, the board approved naming of the ROTC rifle range the Jovure Range, in honor of Sgt. Paul A.

### Earth Turned For 3 Projects At Eastern

RICHMOND, Ky., March 4 (Special) — Despite rain, ground was broken this afternoon on the Eastern State College campus for three building projects which will cost more than \$3,000,000.

On hand for the ceremony were Gov. Bert Combs, Wendell P. Butler, state superintendent of public instruction, and other state and local officials.

Eastern's president, Dr. Robert R. Martin, who took office officially last July drew praise for his work. It was pointed out that projects costing a total of \$3,670,000 were under way at the college.

Today's ceremony took place on the sites for Martin Hall, a dormitory for men costing \$1,363,000; for a \$338,687 addition to Case Hall, a woman's dormitory, and for additional units in Brockton, a housing development for married students, costing \$646,700.

Open house was held in Brockton and a dinner for the college's regents and others was served at the Eastern cafeteria.

The board also approved the increase of registration fees from \$45 to \$55 a semester for Kentucky residents and from \$90 to \$110 a semester for out-of-state students. The training school fee will also be increased, from \$10 to \$20 a semester.

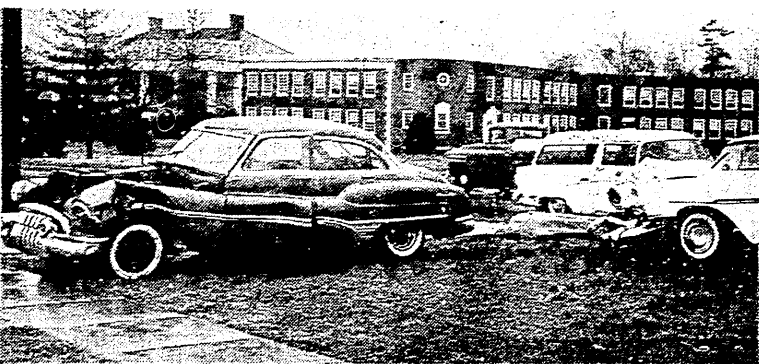
### State Angus Sale Returns \$76,000
