Whereas, there has been deposited in the General Land Office of the United States a CERTIFICATE of the Register of the Land Office at McCook Nebraska, whereby it appears that, pursuant to the Acts of Congress approved March 3, 1873, March 13, 1874, and June 14, 1878, "to encourage the growth of timber on the Western Prairies," the claim of Stephen M. Page has been established and duly consummated in

conformity to law for the Lots numbered one and two and the East half of the North West quarter of Section thirty-one in Township two North of Range thirty-seven West of the Sixth Principal Meridian in Nebraska containing one hundred and fifty-nine acres and sixty-eight hundredths of an acre,

according to the Official Plat of the Survey of the said Land returned to the General Land Office by the Surveyor General.

Now know ye, that there is therefore granted by the UNITED STATES, unto the said Stephen M. Page the tract of Land above described: TO HAVE AND TO HOLD the said tract of Land, with the appurtenances thereof, unto the said Stephen M. Page and to his heirs and assigns forever.

In testimony whereof J. Grover Cleveland, PRESIDENT OF THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, have caused these letters to be made Patent, and the seal of the General Land Office to be hereunto affixed.
