# To the King's Taste . . . Eggs and Imagination

Contemplating the most recent statistics on the consumption of hamburgers, hot dogs and soft drinks in this country, I have come to the conclusion that good eating is on the skids and that the new generation will subsist on lipstick and canned goods. Here we are, knee deep in the finest foodstuffs in the world, but so hamstrung by our lack of imagination that we go on, day after day eating the same old monotonous dishes.

The lowly egg is a perfect example of what I mean. Americans eat more fried, boiled and scrambled eggs than any other people in the world. They don't know any other way to prepare them and the average American housewife cares less. The Old Man eats two fried eggs for breakfast, and that's that.

Here's the spot for Pop to shine at Sunday morning breakfast, just for the family or for company. Let him have a go at this:

Melt two tablespoons of butter in a fireproof baking dish and stir in five and one-half tablespoons of grated Swiss cheese and two tablespoons each of chopped parsley, chopped chives and chopped onion. When things are well blended, add a cup of dry white wine, stirring all the time. Season with salt, white pepper and a little cayenne. Now add six eggs and scramble gently over a very low flame. Serve on freshly made buttered toast. I like this dish with stewed tomatoes, flavored with a shot of Lea & Perrins. Plenty of coffee.

Here's another unusual egg dish that makes a big hit for Sunday breakfast or lunch. It comes from France and has many good variations but it is best known as Eggs Loranzo. Like this:

Make some toast, butter and cut the size of a poached egg. Spread each round with a little cream. Poach an egg in milk for egg round and deposit it thereon. Now make a sauce as follows: Melt a tablespoon of but-



ter in a pan, stir in a tablespoon of flour and season with salt and pepper. Pour in a little at a time, a cup of scalded milk, stirring briskly. Bring to a boil. Lower heat and add three-fourths of a cup of white wine. Reduce in volume, stirring. Sprinkle in a tablespoon of grated Parmesan cheese and a tablespoon of grated Swiss cheese. Stir in a tablespoon of butter. Stir. Now pour the sauce over the eggs and pop the whole works into the oven until it begins to brown. Serve with hot buttered asparagus.

beef which is cooked up brown in butter. Then a fourth of a pound of grated American cheese, a cup of tomatoes and two tablespoons of chili powder. Get this to simmering at a pretty good clip, stir in four beaten eggs and stir all until the eggs are soft and creamy.

Wine, of course, plays a great part in the cooking of eggs, in both plain and fancy fashion. Here is a simple recipe that involves a little Madeira wine:

Butter individual molds and line each with some finely chopped ham and mushrooms. Beat the eggs, one for each mold, with a little milk, salt and pepper. Fill the molds. Place in a pan of hot water and bake until well set. Turn out on plates and cover with a sauce made of two tablespoons of Madeira wine for each egg. Put the wine in a sauce pan with a tablespoon of meat jelly to every six tablespoons of wine and cook it down, stirring all the time. It will make a dark, rich sauce.

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# Your Baby and Mine

This is the real story of a little boy, Duncan, two years younger than his older brother, three years older than his baby brother. It seems as the parents reviewed Duncan's behavior that his most noticeable misconduct appeared after the baby was born. But no matter how they tried to figure out the causes of his conduct, they seemed unable to improve it.

When he began to dislike school and find a dozen reasons for staying at home, they lost faith in their own capacity to work out the problem. They had a conference with his teacher. She assured them of what they already knew that Duncan was as smart, smarter perhaps, than the older brother. The teacher said he adopted a defeatist attitude. Asked to do anything he said, "I can't do it."

It seems as though he could if he would make the effort.

At home he quarreled constantly with the older child. Not just the usual quarrel of any pair of brothers, but exhibiting a mean disposition and a desire to hit and hurt the older boy.

He seemed to be unhappy, too. He cried at nothing and hung onto his mother and acted babyish, to much so for a boy, of 6 years. It distressed them all, and confused them, for it seemed there was no excuse for his behavior. He was loved by both parents.

Eventually, they decided to consult a psychologist. They felt they had exhausted their own knowledge of how to handle this unhappy, obstreperous little boy.

It was the psychologist's considered opinion, after studying the child, his home and parents, that his conduct sprang from two causes, his position in the family and his jealousy of the older child.

His I. Q. was higher than the older child's, but both at home and at school he had to play sec-

ond fiddle to him. Because he could not do the same things, or have the same friends, he had lost confidence in himself. He felt unwanted everywhere, and because he was ill at ease, he preferred to stay at home and be close to his mother.

The birth of the baby was the final event which threw him off stride. He lost then the single factor that might have given him some superiority. Now, he was no longer the baby, and he could never be the privileged oldest child. He was just the middle child, whose only hope of being a noticeable personality was to be different in sex, or have superior skills and talents from the other children.

The psychologist told the parents to make an extra effort to show the child affectionate attention. They were to notice his work in school and praise it. They were to cultivate any special talents he possessed, so that there would be legitimate grounds for this lavish praise.

Fortunately for the child, he had a real talent for drawing and with the co-operation of the teacher this was played up and made much of. It worked like a charm. His moodiness vanished, he stopped crying and quarreling. All he had needed was his place in the sun.
